2012-2013

At the last AGM of The Greens (WA) I stated that we were the only true party of the left and I think the events of the last twelve months have proved that over and over again. What has heartened me over this period is the fact that what started as a time of change and consolidation has turned into a time of expansion, renewed enthusiasm, increased capacity and a vigorous period of self-examination as we determine not only who we are, but who we want to become in the future. A spring after winter indeed.

Through this period we have campaigned in three ordinary elections and one extraordinary by-election. We began this cycle with the disappointment of the State election where we lost the services of two outstanding parliamentarians, Alison Xamon and Giz Watson. In the days following the election the light at the end of the tunnel seemed decidedly distant, and the associated loss of parliamentary tithes led to some difficult decisions being made around the staffing structures of GWA.

We then moved into the Local Government elections where a number of elected GWA members lost their positions on council, some to incredibly small margins, before we moved onto the Federal election where, as we know, we lost Senator Ludlam for a while. The tale of the recount and inspiring win belong properly in Giz's report so I will pass on detail except to note the exceptional role performed by "Gary" in the senator's damascene revival.

On a party level I have been particularly pleased by the growth in membership to record levels, the continued work of codifying our processes, including the grievance and censure by laws, the beginnings of a truly strategic plan and the resuscitation of GWA finances.

As this is my last missive as Co-Convenor I would like to thank some people as none of the above would have been possible without the extraordinary contributions of so many. Undeniably on the shoulders of giants we stand.

Firstly, my fellow office bearers and my colleagues on AWG without whose dedication the party would not function, our office staff and office volunteers who do so much without acknowledgement, the politicians and their staff who contribute so much to the direction of the party. And lastly, but certainly not least, the membership who

enable everything that the party does and provide constant enthusiasm, support and friendship. A better bunch of idealists I could not hope to become associated with.

Finally, I'd like to personally thank my political nursemaids Jess McColl, Rachel Siewert and Giz Watson. It has been an inspiration to benefit from such pedagogues.

I look forward to next chapters in GWA's progress in what I am sure will be halcyon days.

What a tumultuous year it has been! The challenges of the Senate-election-without-end were many and varied and put us all under immense strain in time, resources and emotional energy. But what a triumph! The long and exacting task of scrutinising the recount saw over 200 members team up to find those elusive ballot papers and to show the ALP and PUP people we were a force to be reckoned with. It was a great teambuilding exercise. Then came the lost ballot papers schmozzle, the court appeal and ultimately the by-election. The energy and commitment that so many members put in was truly inspirational – giving us an emphatic win and saw Scott returned to the Senate. Plus we shouldn't understate what a huge boost for morale the win has been for Greens across Australia!

The unprecedented boost in our membership plus the desire to increase our skills and capacity has led to establishing the capacity building and training working group to develop a training strategy leading up to the next Federal election. Training and skill sharing is also vital to foster our Greens culture and improve our capacity to go on winning hearts and minds.

Adam and I have also been closely engaged in national Greens issues, particularly the review of the governance arrangement via the review of the Australian Greens constitution. I am confident we will soon be able to improve the workings of the Greens across the county.

So I think we're travelling pretty well!

Finally, I'd like to thank Adam for his work as Co-Convenor over the last two years and the enthusiasm he has shown to jump in and take on the work of the party. Consensus building is the beating heart of this party

The *brain* or management body of Greens (WA) is the Representatives Council (Reps). The 'lobes' of the brain are the ten Regional Groups (RGs), largely organized according to federal election boundaries. In 2014 Forrest-O'Connor RG has organized local groups around townships; Kununurra also has a local group.

New members join The Greens (WA) via their Regional Group. Most RGs meet monthly so that members can brief their representatives on the business to be discussed at Reps, which meets the second Saturday of every month (except January).

Each RG has two members on Reps: a Permanent Rep (who serves all year) and a Rotating Rep (ideally a different member each month to share Party decision-making).

Office Bearers are elected for one-year terms at the AGM. Up to four additional members are appointed by Reps to form the Administration Working Group (AWG) who undertake the day-to-day management of the Party. In this respect, AWG is somewhat like the *heart*, keeping the *blood* (activities) flowing to keep the body of the Party

functioning, but deferring significant decision-making to the brain.

To press the biological analogy perhaps too far, Working Groups, set up with the authority of Reps, have distinct functions, as do the various *organs* of the body. Working Groups report back to Reps on their activities and seek approval for initiatives outside their mandate.

Regional and Working Groups submit proposals to Reps who work by consensus, with any member having the ultimate right to block a proposal if consensus cannot be achieved. The state and federal politicians and the officebearers are also members of Reps. Every member of the Party has the right to attend Reps meetings.

Consensus decision-making by a large group meeting only once a month is not always swift and timely. To overcome this problem, Reps appoints three members and the Office Bearers to the Quick Decision Making Group (QDMG). All members are eligible to nominate for QDMG, though members who are Permanent Representatives and have a good knowledge of Party determinations are ideal.

The blood of the Party is built on countless hours of unpaid commitment from more than 100 active volunteers, along with critical support at election times or for specialist tasks from thousands of members and supporters.

All this to build a peaceful, sustainable and socially just world for ourselves and those to come.

The most difficult decision Administration Working Group was required to make over the period 2012-2014 concerned our paid position of Party Development Manager. After much soul-searching, in the light of the financial implications, changing circumstances and immediate needs imposed by the result of the state election, Adrian Glamorgan graciously resigned from GWA, a difficult process for all concerned. Praise for Adrian's contribution flooded in from all quarters, for example:

Adrian Glamorgan's efforts, energy and enthusiasm ... we have greatly benefitted from his legacy. He provided particular benefits for people with a diverse range of skills and passions. He was very good at general peace mongering, and fostered a good interface between office and election staff throughout the campaign (Curtin Regional Group)

Adrian undertook his role with a genuine commitment to building a positive culture within the Greens. He made an extra effort to be involved with the South West Greens and we thank Adrian in particular for his support and encouragement with our social media in the recent election. We wish him all the best with his focus on nonviolence and the practice of it within the party and look forward to being part of that process (then South West Regional Group).

Adrian was responsible for building a strong esprit de corps in the office. Busy staff always found time to welcome visitors and members and to deal patiently with the telephone calls that spike with contentious policy announcements, for example concerning asylum seekers.

The resilience of Rowena Skinner, Office Manager, Jenny Sullivan, book-keeper, David Letham, Membership Officer and the other volunteer and casual office staff was proven across three election campaigns, when office workloads expand dramatically and numbers of volunteers multiply. As longstanding office volunteer Jay Birnbrauer said of the senate by-election campaign:

My days in the office throughout the campaign were stimulating and heart-warming. Not once did I hear a raised voice unless it was a cheer. That must be some kind of record and a tribute to all the volunteers and staff many of whom were working very long hours.

Adrian embarked on the process of documenting and streamlining office procedures in an Office Procedures Manual. This reduced (a little) our collective anxiety should Rowena ever be hit by a bus (but not of course our concern for Rowena in such unfortunate circumstances!). Documentation continues, with our financial procedures presently undergoing this process. Kim Dravnieks, as convenor, applied her considerable governance skills to developing a comprehensive Administration Working Group manual and the Regional Group guidelines, recently revised by Co-Convenor Giz Watson. These will be made available on Greenhouse to all members.

With membership at a record high, we held our first new members' event in June 2014. Jess McColl, Giz Watson and Rowena Skinner



produced a new members' kit: a booklet introducing the Greens and a 'how to be involved' booklet; we are redesigning Greenscheme and membership application forms. Membership engagement at the Regional Group level remains uneven, and a challenge for small groups. Moore-Cowan's dramatic increase in participation demonstrates what an energetic, dedicated and savvy Membership Officer (Mary O'Byrne) can achieve. David Letham suggested re-aligning Regional Groups to reflect the new membership patterns, and this will be undertaken when the electoral boundaries are redrawn before the federal election in 2016.

Kim Dravnieks, with Naomi Nation and Linda Johnson, put many hours into developing an 'Ethically Eco' online shop. The Admin Working Group decided that the shop was not a good investment of resources considering other opportunities for fundraising, and decided to close the shop for now, possibly re-opening it in the future to sell election merchandise. While membership soared, the proportion on Greenscheme, our regular giving programme, dropped. A Greenscheme sign-up drive is being organised for September 2014, with volunteers from most of Regional Groups supporting the drive by working the phones.

With three elections behind us, we have paused to imagine the future of the party with the professional support of Galen White, Organisational Architect, who is assisting us to develop a Strategic Management plan. From that we have established that we are unique as a political party because of our base in progressive advocacy groups, and we are unique in progressive advocacy because of our goal of parliamentary representation. From this our goals are:

Implement the Greens vision by electing Greens candidates to every level of government, with the ultimate goal of 'winning every level of government'

Implement the Greens vision by 'changing the conversation' in the Australian community, building understanding and support for Green policy solutions and breaking down Green stereotypes.

We know that enthusiastic volunteers make us uniquely strong as a party. However personnel to recruit, manage and develop volunteers for specific campaigns and activities are in short supply. Over the coming non-election years, we plan to build on the experience of two successful field campaigns run by Ogy Simic, who, sadly for us, left Rachel Siewert's office in September 2014. These were a climate campaign in late 2013-early 2014 (which morphed into the Senate by-election field campaign) and a Bust the Budget campaign in July-August 2014. In all our doorknocking and telephone campaigns, the enthusiasm and dedication of volunteers, many of whom had only joined the Greens in recent months, inspired all involved.

We have outgrown our present premises at 445 Hay Street, particularly chafing after tasting the vision of the 'Greenhouse'. The party was extremely fortunate that Norman Pater, a life member, donated the use of his warehouse and offices in Leederville for our three election campaigns. This gave us a huge space for preparing booth kits and cavorting in afterelection parties (although the Senate by-election in April 2014 involved so many volunteers we had to party elsewhere). We slimmed down our phone bank from the Senate by-election, to a bank of eight phones for future outreach. As a result, Reps meetings could no longer fit in the office and we 'wandered lonely as a cloud' from venue to venue. A space solution is in the works - to be decided by Reps in October or November.

To improve the conduct of Representatives Council meetings, experienced facilitators offered their services in 2013. In 2014, Giz Watson called on members who had been recently trained in facilitation to practise their skills at Reps meetings.

We owe special thanks to our ICT volunteers. Connor Moran, while a member of AWG, ensured that the telephone and computer networks were sufficiently robust to support the campaign staff in the 2013 election campaigns. Grahame Bowland reskinned the website for the state and then federal elections, maintained interaction between Nationbuilder and Civi-CRM in the two federal elections, while ICTWG volunteers built a call centre for the federal by-election and maintained effective troubleshooting at all levels.

David Letham, as Membership Officer and member of ICTWG, maintains member and supporter records; trains volunteers in the use of the Civi-CRM database with equanimity and easy-tofollow manuals; prepares the Election Management System (EMS) in each election for Regional Groups to fill in their booth rosters, doorknocking and leaflet drop records; interfaces with Australian Greens concerning Civi-CRM and EMS. He answers endless queries: 'How do I change a person's family name?' 'Can you get me a list of people living near Subiaco Oval?' 'Who are the lawyers on our data base?' In his more specific role as Membership Officer, David has worked with Rowena Skinner to streamline membership application and renewal processes and joining Greenscheme.

I would like to extend heartfelt thanks to Rowena Skinner, Office Manager, who works many more hours than we can pay her, and whose prescience and troubleshooting has dramatically improved the capacity of a constantly changing group of volunteer office bearers to meet GWA's administrative and financial obligations.

The Office Manager would like to extend a very big Thank You to all the regular office volunteers –

David Letham, Jay Birnbrauer, Steve Yuen, Kym Wakely, Margo Beilby and Jean Le Quesne, former volunteer Bernard Mahon and federal election campaign volunteer Graham Ludlam. They are dedicated and invaluable, and contribute at least 2500 hrs a year; without a doubt the office wouldn't function without them!

Treasurer's Report Mark Siford

The past year has been a challenging one for GWA's finances. It included funding: September 2013 Federal Election; the Court of Disputed Returns legal process; and the April 2014 Senate By-Election. Despite that, GWA finances are in much better shape now than at the beginning of such a momentous year.

2014 saw a significant impact on recurrent revenues from the loss of two WA MPs in the 2013 State election. Fundraising efforts were naturally diverted to the election campaigns and interest income was impacted by lower interest rates and the need to keep cash in at call accounts to pay election expenses. Aside from reconfirming Senator Ludlam's position in the Senate, the standout positive from having two back-to-back elections has been stronger membership revenues on the back of record membership. This was partially countered by higher expenses due to greater demands placed on office and staff resources.

In February 2014, GWA passed a divestment proposal away from banks supporting fossil fuel industries. GWA's new relationship with Police & Nurses bank had the unexpected but delightful result of boosting interest income. As part of divestment, GWA sold a small parcel of Bank of Queensland shares, inherited through a de-mutualisation process.

With so many new members coming into GWA, Greenscheme participation has fallen to around 25%. Accordingly there are plans to increase Greenscheme promotion to our newer members. Greenscheme is an automatic regular donation with the added benefit of the annual membership fee being waived. It is a vital part of running GWA operations and accounts for a third of our operational budget. Greenscheme is not restricted to members, GWA supporters may also join. All members and supporters are encouraged to consider applying for Greenscheme, if in a position to do so.

Going forward the focus is to strengthen GWA's finances and capabilities in a non-election year. One of our major expenses is office rent and outgoings. With the Perth office market showing signs of oversupply and GWA's office lease expiring in 2015, a review of alternatives has commenced.

I acknowledge the invaluable support of our hard working Office Manager Rowena Skinner, Jenny Sullivan's meticulous bookkeeping, fellow members of the Administration Working Group, the revitalized Donor Relations Working Group, and volunteers in GWA's office who keep the lights on. I also take this opportunity to publicly recognize all members and supporters who have contributed time and money during the last two years. Thanks to you, Greens WA is strengthening its financial sinews ahead of our next successful election campaign.

Policy Working Group (PWG) Mark Cooper (Convenor)



Late 2012 and early 2013 constituted a busy time for the Policy Working Group, as we went into state election mode for March 2013 and reviewed nearly every state policy we had. You could be forgiven for thinking that things have been pretty quiet for the PWG since then, but we have been working away in the background for the past year and a half. We have some new policies to unveil now in late 2014.

This writer considers policy-building to be one of the most important things that a political organisation does. Policy is the expression of our party's philosophy and our hopes for the future. It's where we outline our vision and contrast our ideas with the alternatives. When the Greens write a policy down, it's a big commitment because it defines us.

One of the interesting developments of 2014 has been the influx of new members since the federal byelection. Shortly after joining the party, many of these new members ask to be placed on the PWG mailing list. It seems that people are recognising the defining nature of policy and they want to be part of the process. New members learn about our tradition of participatory democracy and want to put it into practice. This is very exciting and it bodes well for the future of the Greens (WA).

To better facilitate participation, the PWG mailing list has been split in two. The mailing list has always been where we get most of our work done. We can't have a hundred meetings to discuss each individual idea, but we can always throw a few emails around until we arrive at consensus. The process works, but it can be unwieldy, so now we have two lists – one for concrete policy proposals and one for policy 'chat'. The chat list is for discussion, hardcore political philosophy and throwing around ideas.

Despite its freeform nature, the chat list can produce concrete proposals when the process of deliberation has run its course.



So what have we been working on? We have primarily been occupied with our new state policy on voluntary euthanasia (VE). We took to the list a policy proposal that had been put forward several years ago. One of our concerns was that the new document should be congruent with a bill on VE that Robin Chapple will be introducing to Parliament. Once we had collected input from the list, we conducted a face-to-face meeting at the Greens (WA) office with Robin in attendance. The resulting document was put to the Regional Groups as a proposal. The message from the groups was one of broad support, along with a long list of suggestions.

The input from Regional Groups will be incorporated into a new version of the VE policy, which will once again be put to the Regional Groups. Nothing can become Greens (WA) policy without the approval of the local groups. Our local groups are the governing bodies of the party. The process is a long one, but the resulting policy document will be a superior one, having been examined and refined by all of us working together.

There are two types of policy that we deal with – state and federal. For quite some time now we have had a very successful arrangement where the PWG has had a pair of co-convenors. Anthony Blond has been taking care of federal policy while I have been dealing with state policy. Anthony is well known to everyone in the Greens (WA) as a tireless volunteer worker in what seems like a hundred different roles. Unfortunately for the PWG, Anthony has had to take off one hat in order to do justice to some others. Not only do we thank Anthony for everything he has done for the PWG, we thank him for everything that he continues to do for the party.

So what else are we working on? Watch this space for upcoming revisions of our waste and drugs policies. Currently we don't have a veterans' affairs policy at the state level. Start thinking about these issues, and if you want to be part of the discussion, drop us a line.

Donor Relations Working Group was formed in 2012 with the objective of providing substantial and predictable financial support to the party by developing and maintaining good donor relations. As part of the election campaigns we held three donor liaison events, inviting participants from the sustainable energy and other economic sectors and our own major donors. Although the two events held in Spacecubed generated enormous enthusiasm for Scott Ludlam's WA2.0 vision and some volunteers and members, donations did not recoup the cost of the events. We found our members to be far more generous, opening your wallets to provide the largest funding ever achieved in our two federal election campaigns. We thank all our donors, large and small, who reached deep into their pockets to get Scott elected and re-elected.

With the elections behind us temporarily, we are concentrating on diversifying the ways in which donors can contribute to the party. Trish Cowcher has been working on a bequest scheme, for which we can have no more appropriate patron than Jo Vallentine. Mark Siford (ex-officio member as Treasurer) and Norman Pater are developing a Greens Future Fund to allow supporters to contribute to our long term financial sustainability. Jess McColl and Chilla Bulbeck, with the assistance of Ciatriona Scully and Katie O'Connor, developed and implemented a Greenscheme signup letter and telephone drive. Kim Dravnieks, convenor, liaises with National Fundraising Working Group particularly in relation to regular appeal letters. She organised our first fundraising event at SpaceCubed and is documenting our donor relations practices, preparing information leaflets and website pages to encourage members and supporters to join Greenscheme, invest in the Future Fund, make a donation as a gift from another person or remember the Greens in their will. Rosalie Miles has been a consistent support at our donor liaison events and in making follow up phone calls. We would also like to thank Lisa Rossi, GWA member and fundraiser for Sea Shepherd, for providing invaluable training in asking for money!

We have been served well by the members of our working group. But we urgently need more volunteers to support us in this utterly essential aspect of sustaining and growing our party. ICTWG members put in a huge effort during the elections, including Robin Elden de Garis and David Letham who seemed to live in the campaign office, keeping the phones running and synchronising the data between systems. Grahame Bowland and Anthony Blond were instrumental in targeting voters, and Anthony's gVIRS system is now being rolled out nationally to assist with campaign management.

Of course, there have been a lot of other odd jobs. ICTWG has also spent time chasing gremlins in office IT systems and improving ongoing capabilities. None of this would have been possible without our wonderful volunteers.

We would be remiss not to take this opportunity to seek new volunteers, especially for the website upgrade kicking off now and a number of other projects on the horizon. Green Issue is the official newsletter of The Greens (WA). It is published every two months, with the first issue of each year appearing in the first half of February. It aims to provide articles representing the range of our members' views, as well as reports from our parliamentarians and alerting members to upcoming events. Its contributing editors over the previous two years have been Chilla Bulbeck, Rob Delves and Chris Johansen, with design and layout by Craig Chappelle.

Green Issue is primarily distributed electronically but there remains a requirement for hard copy magazine format, which confines us to a prescribed numbers of pages – generally 16 or 20. However, contributions usually exceed that limit. Even with the loss of two "poli pages", those of Giz Watson and Alison Xamon, after the last state election, there is frequently enough material to exceed 20 pages. It thus becomes necessary to pull out the editorial knives to delete paragraphs or phrases, omit entire articles or postpone them to a future issue. We apologise to contributors so affected and reiterate that it is a matter of limited space, not a value judgment on the input.

We have continued with the policy, introduced in 2012, of assigning a theme to each issue and inviting contributions around that theme. Recently, we have covered such themes as a "low carbon future", "health" and "peace and nonviolence". However, for most of 2013, the theme was "elections" – the state election in March and the federal election in September. Pre-election issues captured the enthusiasm and optimism of the campaign, while post-election issues recorded the commiserations accompanying disappointing results. But, the roller coaster ride was not over with the February 2014 issue reflecting the suspense of court appeals and a senate recount, and the determination of The Greens (WA) to retrieve the situation once a senate re-run was called. The April issue was truly a celebratory one, documenting how the west was won.

We really still have far to go in adequately reflecting The Greens (WA) happenings on a state-wide basis. Interesting things are going on outside Perth Metro – such as the high Greens vote in The Kimberley in the last state election and experimentation with Local Groups in the South West. We need to keep better track of these, so would value more regular contributions from the Regions.

The Constitution Working Group has been dormant over this reporting period primarily because there is a major review of the national constitution in train. As a number of the sections in the Greens (WA) constitution are related to the Australian Greens constitution it makes sense for us to wait for the outcome of the national review – due in November 2014. Meanwhile, a number of Greens (WA) members are closely involved in the national review and continue to play a strong role in reflecting the views of our WA members on the governance of our national body and developing a national consensus for a new constitution.

Similarly, across Perth Metro, we seek out approaches being explored by different Regional Groups on how to spread The Greens message. To facilitate this wider coverage we also solicit more members to join GIEWG, for an expanded editorial perspective.

We would like more feedback from readers. Some articles raise issues that would be controversial even among Greens members, for which it would be instructive to have an ongoing conversation. We thus encourage "letters to the editor" and rejoinder or follow-up articles on particular topics.

Election campaigns are when the Greens come together to offer the public exciting and interesting candidates who represent our visionary policies to the electorate. It is a huge endeavour, taking vast amounts of the party's resources, time and energy. Luckily elections are also addictive, exciting and life changing as we contested three elections in the last 15 months.

How did we do it, you ask: Well, the Reps Committee of Greens (WA) authorises the formation of Election Campaign Committees to organise the running of elections. Election Campaign Committee are made up of representatives from each Regional Group, some of the candidates and election staff plus an enormous amount of expertise from our members, supporters and the general public.

Election Campaign Committees oversee all aspects of the campaign, including budgeting, messaging, media, legal responsibilities with the Australian Election Commission, public outreach, including door knocking and phone banking, developing candidates and training volunteers, fundraising and more.

The Election Campaign Committee (ECC) was formed as SECC (State Election Campaign Committee) to contest the state election on 8 March 2013. ECC worked tirelessly to contest all 6 Upper House seats of state parliament. We reelected Lynn MacLaren for South Metropolitan Region and Robin Chapple for Mining and Pastoral Region. Unfortunately with the swing to the conservative vote Giz Watson, standing in South West Region, and Alison Xamon, standing for re-election to the East Metropolitan Region, did not retain their seats, while Cameron Poustie, standing in Giz Watson's 'old seat' of North Metropolitan, was also defeated by the conservative swing. This is a great loss to Parliament, the Greens and the community.

Immediately after the state election ECC reformed into the Federal Election Campaign Committee (FECC) and took on contesting the federal election on 7th September 2013. We all know that the result was very close and Scott Ludlam lost by a handful of votes.

FECC picked itself up to oversee the recount, the Court of Disputed Returns challenge and the election on 5th April this year. The 2014 election campaign was breathtaking. Members and supporters Australia-wide rallied to ensure that Scott was re-elected to the Senate. It was exciting to be part of a victorious result where we achieved our highest ever Greens vote in a WA federal election.

We would like to personally thank all the members of ECC, SECC and FECC. As volunteers they gave up enormous amounts of time and shared with us their expertise and skills. Also, a big thank you to all the staff who worked on the last three elections. We could not have done it without you.

Also we pay tribute to our candidates who put themselves forward in a very public way. They are the face of our campaign, articulating our vision, meeting the voters and talking to the media. It is a demanding job and requires a huge amount of dedication and commitment.

Elections bring out the best in the Greens and our members. We work creatively and tirelessly together for a common purpose and aim to change the world. Congratulations to everyone involved in the three elections.

And now FECC has morphed into the Election Campaign Committee (ECC) with the view of contesting the next federal election and then the state election (March 2017). But first the Vasse byelection, probably in October. I hope you can get involved in the next big green adventure.

Key outcomes of the past two years:

- A complete Policy Review took place at the 2012 July and November National Policy Conferences, in view of the 2013 Federal election. Many thanks to Cameron Poustie and Anthony Blond (then WA AGPCC Reps) for ensuring WA's full participation in this.
- A revision of the WA-NWG Mandate approved at Reps Council in May 2013.



- Update and confirmation of WA Reps on National Working Groups – see below.
- An extremely cost effective July 2013 National Council was conducted on line opening the way for future online meetings, if deemed feasible.
- Processes put in place to ensure effective NWG budget management
- 30% increase in NWG membership, which currently has 28 members.

WA members have held key roles at the National level: Christine Cunningham and Di Evers served as Co-Convenor and Treasurer respectively on the Australian Greens Coordinating Committee (AGCG) Nov. 2012-Nov.13. Both were re-elected for another year in November 2013. Giz Watson was elected AGCG General member. Chilla Bulbeck was elected to the Green Magazine Editorial team.

The main areas of review and concern for the past two years (apart from the Policy Review) have been National Finances and a review of the Australian Greens Constitution – both will hopefully be finalised at the 2014 National Conference. Many thanks to Jess McColl, Mark Siford, and to Christine Cunningham and Giz Watson, respectively, for leading WA's drive in these key areas of concern and reform.

Future meetings:

The 2014 July National Council is to be held in Sydney and National Conference in Canberra in November. National Council Meetings are currently held in either Sydney or Melbourne – introduced at November 2013 National Conference to facilitate delegate accessibility – unless deemed suitable for one per annum to be held on line. The frequency of future Council Meetings depends on the outcome of the proposed revised Constitution at November Conference. WA has flagged an interest in hosting the 2015 National Conference.

The Australian Young Greens also plan to hold a Young Greens Conference in October.

Now we have a WA Young Greens banner – the first Young Greens specific banner in the nation! When designing the banner we embraced the traditional Greens triangle and the peace symbol, to make our own logo. It has now seen a few rallies and university events. We are also sitting just under 300 likes for our Facebook page, and approximately the same for our group – so remember to like and join to keep updated on events!

2011 saw the launch of the Greens WA Training Program, designed to help the Party with capacity building, knowledge and skill sharing towards retaining our new members and re-engaging older ones. The program continued in 2012-14, with a range of workshops and seminars, for both Greens WA members and our wider activist networks.

During 2012, 12 workshops were held, with attendance an average of 15-40 people. Entry to all these Greens Workshops was by donation.

Workshops for everyone – including newbies and nonmembers:

Greens 101: Intro to the party, policies + people. **Introduction to Consensus**

Politics 101: All about our political system. **Law for Activists:** half day seminar run by solicitors <u>For experienced members and 101 "graduates" only:</u> **Advanced Consensus:** Troubleshooting, diving deeper and extending consensus-forging skills

Calling Candidates: What's involved in running for a lower house seat

Facilitator Training: How to facilitate Reps/Greens meetings and guide the decision making process. In approximately the course of one year, WA faced a state election, a federal election and a federal Senate byelection. So from late 2012 until first quarter 2014, the WA campaign offered training opportunities in a more organised and extensive way than was the case in past campaigns. During the state and federal elections almost 1000 people received training in 38 training sessions, delivered in diverse locations on topics including Greens 101, Consensus skills,

Communicating the Greens Story, Federal Policy Overview, Doorknocking Skills and Digital Campaign Skills. This included the Outreach Coordinator taking trips to deliver training in Albany, Balingup and Bunbury.

Two-day Candidate Training weekends were held for both the state and federal elections with approximately 50 people attending each one. Overall, the workshops received positive participant feedback and played a key role in developing the campaign skills of our supporters.

A series of new or updated PowerPoint presentations were developed for use in future campaigns, as was an electronic version of the Booth Worker Training package.

During the Federal by-election, Tim lo Surdo and Ogy Simic, working with trainer and GWA member, Barb Frey, and Holly Hunter, an experienced trainer who joined us from 'over east', provided training associated with field campaigning. This included training days for neighbourhood co-ordinators and doorknockers, training before the phone banking sessions for volunteers and debriefs after doorknocking.

300 volunteers led by 35 team leaders knocked on 28,000 doors, walking 9000 miles (our goal was 14,000 miles!) 250 phonebanking volunteers made 50,000 calls at two WA sites and twelve interstate locations.

Following the by-election, Giz Watson initiated the formation of a Capacity Building and Training Working Group. Half a dozen enthusiastic and marvellously skilled trainers joined our stalwart Katrina Bercov to form the WG, which Robyn Williams kindly agreed to convene. In August Sam la Rocca (Adam Bandt's office, Melbourne) offered a training day for likeminded advocacy groups and a 'tell your story' training for Greens members.

Greens Refugee Action Group (GRAG)

The last two years have been a disastrous time for refugees and asylum seekers in Australia. Not only is the world seeing a dramatic increase in the number of displaced people, but the past Labor and current Liberal governments seemed to have become proportionately less compassionate. The icing on this inhumane cake has been "Operation Sovereign Borders" – a campaign whose title reveals the shift away from the people suffering and on to a detached border policy.

This was even more explicitly demonstrated by our government's response to the death of Reza Berati. His death in the Manus Island detention centre and the subsequent shoulder-shrugging of the government showed us just how entrenched this dehumanising policy is.

However as these policies become less and less caring, an equal and opposite reaction has resulted. Many new members to the Greens WA have cited the treatment of refugees as a central reason for joining us in 2013-2014. This has seen a very large increase in the membership of the Greens Refugee Action Group and caused us to be more involved than ever in helping the plight of these vulnerable people.

This energy has translated into our participation in rallies and protests. The biggest of these was our presence at this year's Palm Sunday 'Walk for Justice' in the centre of Perth. This saw dozens of Greens members come together (along with



hundreds from the rest of the community) to show our support for those indefinitely imprisoned by our government (even though they have committed no crime). Our banners were held high and in the sea of people, the Greens stood out as the party committed to providing a compassionate and safe solution to this growing issue.

Here, I feel a need to specifically mention Anita Lumbus and Leonie Lundy who, though they always respond in self-deprecating phrases, need acknowledgement for their ongoing commitment to refugees and the Greens Refugee Action Group. Through our group (and many other outside organisations), they have guided our involvement and action through to mid-2014 when I took over as Convener. They were a key part of, or directly organised, all of our involvement in refugee action in the past two years and their energy is a central asset to our cause.

The Greens Refugee Action Group recently had a face-to-face meeting to discuss the future of our group and the issues that are important to us. The outcome of this was eight statements on which we came to consensus. The main theme of these statements was that education of the public and shrewd political responses to misinformation is what's needed. Providing this in 2014-2015 will be our aim.

2013-14 has been a fantastic year for the Brand Greens. Having faced the challenges of both the state and federal elections, we have bounced back stronger than ever!

During the by-election, we campaigned hard and knocked on over 1000 doors, distributed 2000 leaflets at local train stations and achieved full coverage across all polling booths. Our efforts culminated in a 13% vote overall which went as high as 19% in some booths.

Our membership is growing steadily, bolstered by the many wonderful people who have joined us since the election (the youngest of whom is 13!). This has enabled us to run many local campaigns simultaneously. These include a grassroots community campaign against the 'Waste to Energy' plants proposed for Rockingham and Kwinana, continuation of the Hands Off Point Peron campaign against the canal estate development planned at Point Peron and the very successful six week #BustTheBudget campaign against the Abbott Budget.

Outside of the local area, Brand members have attended rallies, events, workshops and meetings, ensuring that we always have a voice at the table. Also, as Convenor, I have enjoyed building a closer relationship between Brand and other Regional Groups, such as Curtin and Fremantle-Tangney.

We have refocused our efforts on providing a social aspect to the group. To this end we've organised several social events including very well attended Christmas and post-election parties with more planned for the future. We are also making use of social media via a members only Facebook Group and have recently found a permanent home in a community facility.

Although I'm sure there will be further challenges in the years to come, I believe the future of the Brand Greens is very bright indeed.

Nation being the mainstay of his support team. The September 2013 federal election and the 2014 byelection saw the addition of myself, Ian Rudd and various other members join Margo and Naomi in handing out HTV cards at pre-polling booths and staffing booths on polling day. Members also attended various training sessions in preparation.

In the months preceding the September election, several members wrote 'letters to the editor' of their local newspapers. These were usually printed but little action came of them. We like to think that these letters made people think. While Damon didn't win his seat, the overall outcome for The Greens was (eventually) hugely successful.

Early in 2014 Naomi arranged a public presentation by Assoc. Prof. Rod Giblett, secretary of Friends of Forrestdale, in February and held at the Armadale City Library. The Canning Greens got behind this cause in a bid to save the Anstey-Keane damplands – an area of greater biodiversity than Kings Park under threat of partial destruction. Letters were written, in support of conservation of native land, to the Armadale Council as Greens members and supporters of Friends of Forrestdale, expressing our concerns. It is with great pleasure that I can inform everyone that the Anstey-Keane damplands are officially safe from interference – at least for now.

We also have a Facebook page – Greens for Canning. It was originally administered by Damon and Naomi, who have subsequently passed the torch to Linda Johnson. With the federal election approaching, and some dedicated networking the page increased by around 13% without using any paid advertising.

The Ethically Eco site is another initiative strongly contributed to by Canning's members, officially launched on 1 January 2014. The site is intended as a source of fundraising for The Greens (WA). Should the right demographic be introduced to this site some form of steady income is possible, but for the moment the site is in hibernation.



Our members represented Canning in events, marches and rallies, e.g. Perth March Against Refugee Detention (August 2013), Greens literature distribution at the Mundijong Fair, Selection of the order of Canning ballot papers in Armadale, Ban Live Export Stall in Armadale, Apology to John Pat (Demand for a Royal Commission into Indigenous Deaths in Custody) at Parliament House, scrutineer training in Perth. Walk for Constitutional Recognition at Cottesloe Beach, Steve Marsh (anti) GMO rally at Supreme Court Gardens, Rally Against Manus Island in Forrest Chase and the (anti) TPP March through Perth in March 2014. My younger son, Cayle Johnson (who took many of the rally photographs to be posted on the Greens for Canning's Facebook page) and I attended and provided photographs to Linda who kindly created a film-clip posted on Youtube for public viewing and can be seen here:

Margo has also been working at the Greens office archiving records as well as doing her regional duties.

The last two years started with a disappointing state election result and has culminated in a sense of the new with a new regional group name and new local groups.

In 2012 the South West RG was meeting quarterly and in August 2012 it was Margaret River's turn. Having already preselected Giz as our South West UH candidate, campaigning had begun. Over 60 members and supporters joined us to hear from Giz and Scott Ludlam at Glenbrook Estate. Our November 2012 AGM in Bridgetown was to be our last quarterly South West meeting, as we prepared for state and federal elections in 2013 and eventually changes to our regional group.

The highlight of the 2013 state election was the Art Auction held in Margaret River at Cullen Wines in Willyabrup. A hugely successful fundraiser and fantastic evening. The generosity of the artists who gave so much time to produce the works that made the evening possible was inspiring.

By the time the March election hit we had our full contingent of lower house candidates with Hsien Harper supporting Giz on the UH ticket. Ultimately we were unsuccessful and the State Parliament lost one of its most respected politicians in Giz.

The Federal Election campaign was on us before we had time to recover and gather our thoughts. Gordon Tayler in Forrest and Diane Evers in O'Connor were our candidates and their willingness to step up when needed was vital in moving our group out of the disappointment of the state results and negativity evident at the Donnelly River post- election debrief. The federal result was disappointing and followed by the WA senate result emotional roller coaster. Our 2013 South West AGM in Margaret River at Tingrith Meeting house was a time for reflection and an acknowledgment that change was needed. Our state South West UH vote of 7.92% had barely risen from the 7.51% achieved in 1996 and we were having difficulty finding members who would take on roles with the regional group. At the AGM, we agreed to move focus from the South West Greens to local groups.

At the February 2014 GWA Reps Council meeting, the proposal to rebadge the South West Regional Group as the Forrest O'Connor Regional Group was approved. At the same time the first local group, the Busselton Dunsborough Greens, was recognised by the WA Greens. Meeting monthly alternating between Busselton and Dunsborough, the group has been able to maintain an ongoing presence with convenor Michael Baldock and committee of Nerilee Boshammer and Jeremy Baker.

The Senate Election re-run was uplifting in not just the final outcome but what it has helped activate locally. No better example is Bunbury Against Coal Exports (BACE) which continues its campaign driven by Greens members and is gaining support from those outside the party.

The Margaret River Greens Local Group with Alistair Spong as Convenor and assisted by Sabine Lane and Neroli Carlton on the committee were approved at the June Reps Council Meeting. Alistair and the Margaret River Greens were active doorknockers, including a session with Rachel Siewert travelling up to Carey Park in Bunbury.

Albany and Denmark members met in Albany on the 17th of June 2014 and agreed to the formation of the South Coast Greens Local Group and the committee of Karen McKeough (Convenor), Catherine Moore and Hugh Watkins. The South Coast Greens covers Walpole to Esperance, including the towns and hinterlands of Walpole, Denmark, Albany, Mt Barker, Bremer Bay, Jerramungup, Ravensthorpe and Hopetoun.

The change to becoming the Forrest O'Connor Greens has resulted in a number of areas now becoming part of our Regional Group, in particular Kalgoorlie and Esperance. Our Esperance Greens membership had fallen to zero, but is now starting to grow again and their desire to be part of the South Coast Greens is a great outcome of recent changes.

What Next?

Having set up three local groups, the question is now how to foster their development and what are the next groups to form. At the Forrest O'Connor Greens AGM in Albany later in 2014, this will be at the centre of discussion.

The Fremantle-Tangney Greens meet on the Thursday before Reps usually in the upstairs Council Reception Room at the Fremantle Town Hall, with about 20 members attending most meetings. Like many other regional groups we have enjoyed a stunning increase in membership over the last 12 months. Some have jumped right in with full-on enthusiasm for monthly meetings and activist campaigns. Others, however, have disappeared and we are aware of the need to do much more to make

use of their talents and interests. Several of these new members came through the same door – involvement in the election campaigns, especially the recent Senate by-election. This campaign was an inspiring blend of central organisation and grassroots activism. Our three local team leaders - Robyn Williams, Matt Grimbly and Shane Guthrie - each coordinated large and enthusiastic groups of people who knocked on thousands of doors in the Fremantle region. Door knocking teams were in action again for the Bust the Budget campaign.

Fremantle-Tangney's Events Team continued to organise an exciting array of activities. These included social events for our own members and events to connect with the electorate. The Fremantle Refugee Welcome Fiesta and the Fremantle Festival Parade have been highlights of our annual calendar for at least three years now. Both events were very well supported and presented The Greens in an exciting and dramatic manner to the Fremantle community.

Chris Johansen and Rob Delves have been putting together a lively monthly newsletter for several years; recently they have been joined by new member Julia Jones who has contributed much-needed IT skills.

Leonie Lundy (2013) and Kim Dravnieks (2014) have done a great job in ensuring that our online discussion system works well in dealing with Reps Proposals. We feel that this gives many more members the opportunity to have their say about the proposals and it also streamlines the discussion process at each monthly meeting.

For the last two years we have made it a priority to set aside at least 30 minutes of every monthly meeting to discuss a major policy or area of interest. Topics are suggested by members who have a passion for a particular issue. It is an important opportunity for members to educate themselves about Greens policies and to improve their skills in communicating the Greens' values and positions on important issues. This initiative has been much appreciated and on some occasions the discussion has run for nearly half the meeting. A wonderful recent example was the discussion on peace and nonviolent conflict resolution led by Adrian Glamorgan and Elizabeth Po.

We are attempting to increase the number of members taking on the leadership roles by having teams rather than individuals take on each role. This applies particularly to the roles of Membership, Events and Newsletter. Our hope is that at least 20 people will be part of this expanded version of office bearers in the Fremantle-Tangney Regional Group each year.

This year the Moo-Cows have been very active, both with campaigning in the federal by-election and with our continuing tradition of having open meetings with guest speakers. This year has seen our membership grow too. I had a look back at our report for 2011-2012, and back then we were concerned about attendance at regional meetings. This has ceased to be a problem!

The by-election has obviously prompted a surge in new memberships, and there are other factors driving people to take the plunge and join up. The Abbott government's policies are pushing more people our way, and there seems to be a growing awareness of the Greens in Moore and Cowan. This may have a lot to do with our doorknocking efforts during the election, and it may also reflect changes in demographics.

The northern suburbs are growing, and different kinds of people are moving into the area. Our Greens (WA) election mapping software identified a section of Padbury that is as Green as Fremantle! Voting patterns are changing, and politically aware people are being moved to action. It's been great to see people joining up and then wanting to know about the different working groups. People want to contribute. It's also been great to welcome new members from many different age groups.

There are Moo-Cows working in events, policy, coordination, and campaigning roles within the various working groups at a state level. We have the policy of giving new members something to do when they join - or at least we try to find something that they might find interesting or inspiring.

One of the most interesting open meetings we had involved a presentation by Claire McKinnon from No Fracking Way. She updated us on where the debate surrounding hydraulic fracturing for natural gas stands in W.A. and Australia as a whole. Our state's beautiful Kimberley region is severely threatened, and W.A. will need to build a strong movement to protect it. It was inspiring to hear about farmers working together with Greens to protect agricultural land in the eastern states.

This is a truly beautiful place and a biodiversity hotspot, threatened with a proposed iron ore mine. Members were keen to do something to help, and many of us made submissions to the E.P.A. requesting that the proposed mine be classified as 'A.P.I. category B – environmentally unacceptable'.

In August we got together with Clean Up Australia and organised a clean-up morning for Callander Park in Kinross. We found an unbelievable number of plastic bottles and made that little part of the world a lot cleaner. This kind of hands-on work is great for team building, so we might be doing a bit more of this kind of thing. Some tree planting next time perhaps?

And I have to mention our social event at the Sovereign Arms in Joondalup. We ate some very nice food, drank some very nice drinks and had some great conversations. Unfortunately, everybody was having such a great time we forgot to take any photos of the event. Our Facebook page is bereft of party shots.

Next on the agenda for Moore-Cowan is the approach of local government elections. Some of our members have expressed a strong interest in running for the Joondalup and Wanneroo City Councils. We will be working closely with the Election Campaign Committee to make this a successful venture. Other plans for the future include a public presentation on the power of divestment. There is no shortage of enthusiastic people wanting to make next year our best year.



Durack, including the East Kimberley Local Group

In one of the largest electorates in the world, it has been difficult to maintain support for our Greens members and supporters in Durack, despite the tireless criss-crossing of the electorate by Robin Chapple, our MLC for Mining and Pastoral.

Chris Maher, the lower house Greens candidate for Kimberley in the 2013 State election, almost secured an historic victory – achieving a swing of 10% compared with the state wide swing against the Greens and missing out by less than 370 votes. Congratulations to all the members and supporters: who came out again in force to achieve an additional swing for Scott Ludlam in the senate by-election campaign.

June Lowe worked in Robin Chapple's office to identify Greens members and supporters for the 2014 senate by-election campaign, innovatively contacting people in likely professions such as teacher, social worker, environmental officer. As a result, many people across Durack came to learn they were not 'the only Green in the village'. All major booths were covered, with the exception of Tom Price, Newman and East Carnarvon, as well as most medium priority booths. Scott Ludlam was skyped into Kununurra, a Greens Facebook page was set up by Geraldton Greens, and community Facebook posts were used elsewhere. Kim Dravnieks successfully co-ordinated the booths in Geraldton. June Lowe suggests 'adopt a town' for the next election, in which metropolitan Regional Groups adopt difficult to staff towns and descend en masse – as Robin Chapple does in Kalgoorlie at each election.

In March 2014, Kununurra members formed the East Kimberley Local Group, modelled on the by-laws developed by Michael Baldock, Forrest-O'Connor convenor, for successful local groups formed around townships in the south-west. Local groups encourage face-to-face meetings and a focus on activism in relation to local issues. Conversations continue with key members to form a West Kimberley local group centred on Broome. Plans to build more connections between Greens in Durack, via Skype, Teambuilder, local groups and support from Robin Chapple's and Rachel Siewert's offices lack an enthusiastic organiser with the time and energy.
