How to vote for the Greens

Vote for the Greens in the House of Representatives

Step 1 Get the small green paper.



Step 2 Write the number 1 in the box next to the Greens name.

Step 3 Number all other boxes in the order that you choose.

You **must** number each box for your vote to be counted.



Step 4 Put the green paper in the box.

Vote for the Greens in the Senate

Step 1 Get the big white paper.



Step 2 Fill out the big white paper

Step 3 Put the big white paper in the box.

You can fill out the big white paper 2 ways.

You can choose to

 write numbers 1 to 6 in the boxes above the line

or

 write numbers 1 to 12 in the boxes below the line.

Write number 1 in the box above the Greens name.

- to have equal rights
- to be included
- to have a **good life**.

A good life might mean

• a home you can pay for

- a job



- a free education
- a safe climate.

A safe climate might mean clean air or less floods and bushfires.



We want big businesses and billionaires to

• **not** pay **politicians** to get what they want



• pay more tax.

Tax is money used to pay for things to help you.



A politician is someone you choose to make laws for Australia.



We want to use the extra money to look after

• people

and



• the environment.



We will use the extra money to

- make sure programs have enough money and staff to look after people
 - for example, the National Disability
 Insurance Scheme or NDIS



- make sure people can get the health care they need
 - for example, dental care through Medicare



• protect the animals and environment





be able to increase government payments to
88 dollars a day

• build accessible homes that people can pay for

- for example, the Jobseeker or Pension.





We will also

- make education free
 - for example, childcare or university
- make schools more accessible and inclusive.



Accessible means everyone can

- get to a place
- use a service.



Inclusive means

• everyone is welcome



• everyone can join in.



We will also

 make more jobs accessible to people with disability



- make places more accessible
 - for example, train stations and parks.
